

TREKK is now connected with 67 emergency departments in Canada, a 72% increase from last year.



## TREKK APP

In 2018 we launched our mobile app at the request of rural and remote community hospitals, where accessing online resources isn’t always an option due to lack of Internet connection and cellular data.


